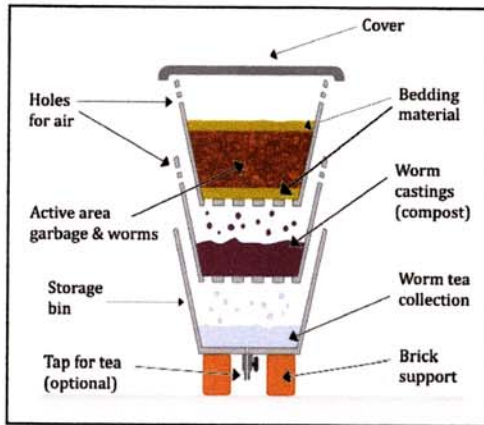


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Diagram of a DIY worm farm

Vermicomposting

Here is what you need to get started:

Container of wood or plastic-

First you need a container with some holes in it for moisture and air to circulate. Place this container inside another container or on top of a tray or shallow pan. The inner container needs to be slightly lifted up so that any worm tea will drain off. Use red worms.

Bedding material-

Start with some moistened, shredded newspaper, a couple of handfuls of garden soil, not potting soil, and some crushed eggshells or vegetable pulp.

Food-

You can feed your worms egg shells, fruit and vegetable scraps and any non-meat or non-dairy food scraps. Your worms will eat about half their body weight each day.

Keep the farm temperature between 40 - 85 degrees F.

Farming worms:

Place the damp shredded newspaper with the garden soil and vegetable scraps in the container. Don't pack it down. Add the worms to their new home.
